A number of settlements scattered across Darewadi, 50km from Nashik, is in the dark. "These settlements are still to be connected to the power grid. Being isolated, cattle as well as children

have succumbed to attacks by wild animals like panthers etc. Life indeed is very tough and hazardous, particularly at nights and during monsoon when it rains heavily, the villagers face extreme discomfort here," says club member Vinayak Deodhar.

The club is assisting children with their academics in a village school here and "we decided to give solar lanterns to the families. Now the villagers can carry this lantern at night to go out without any fear." The lanterns were sponsored by club member Ravindra Mahadeokar.

The club is planning to install solar street lights and distribute solar lamps to the households in some of these settlements soon.

'Joy of Giving' events at Agra

o celebrate the 117th
Foundation Day of Rotary (Feb 23) with week-long programmes, all the Rotary clubs in Agra, RID 3110, collaborated to observe each day with different themes under which multifaceted events were held with a single message of 'One Rotary, one aim — Serve to change lives'.

RC Agra, the oldest club in the region, took up two projects on this day under *Joy of Giving* theme — it extended financial support to an underprivileged boy for his treatment of thalassaemia major; and

distributed school kits to children from slum areas in Agra.

Jitendra Kumar Garg, father of five-year-old Ved Garg and a resident of Kheragarh, a small town in Agra district, approached the club seeking financial help for the treatment of his son inflicted with thalassaemia major since birth. Due to severe deficiency of haemoglobin chain synthesis, the boy suffered from symptomatic anaemia requiring lifelong transfusion and medical support.

There was a life-threatening risk factor attached to transfusion therapy and the doctors advised

Jitendra Garg to go for bone marrow transplant for a permanent solution to his son's painful life.

"As the transplant process is very expensive, Garg who is a daily wage worker reached out to various social organisations for financial support. Meanwhile, his son Ved was examined by the South East Asia Institute for Thalassaemia, Jaipur. After many tests, they concluded that the boy's mother to be the potential candidate as the bone marrow donor," explained Rtn Manoj R Kumar, project contact from RC Agra.

The hospital quoted the total cost at ₹11 lakh for the six-month process of bone marrow transplant and the treatment was supposed to start by February-end. Through help from local NGOs and a campaign run by media houses like the Amar Ujala, the parents could mobilise ₹9 lakh and were still short of total requirement amount by ₹2 lakh. Then Jitendra Garg reached out to the club which agreed to pay for the medical expenses and handed over a

cheque of ₹2 lakh to them as part of Rotary Foundation Week celebration under Joy of Giving.

"The money was pooled in by the club members with Rtn Ram Saran Mittal making a big contribution of ₹71,000. The cheque for ₹2 lakh was handed over to Ved's parents by our club president Ashish Agarwal. We hope to see the boy come back hale and hearty after treatment to resume his schooling and studies like any other normal child," said Manoj Kumar.

Back to School

In another outreach activity on Rotary Day, the club distributed school kits to 50 children at Taj Nagari, Phase 2, a slum colony. Each school kit has a school bag, notebooks, drawing copy, pencil box, sharpeners, erasers and pencil colours. Social worker Tina Singh, wife of wing commander Prabhjeet Singh, is closely working with the children to help them get all

the resources for a good life by coordinating with the Rotarians.

"We are trying to get the children enrolled in nearby primary schools after identifying the classes they are suitable for," said Tina. Another social worker Vikram said, "while the men work as daily wage labourers, their wives are employed as domestic help in residential apartments. But the pandemic has hit them hard depriving them of their daily earnings. And the most affected of them all are the children of these marginalised families."

Lack of resources

Before the pandemic, 14-year-old Chandan studying in Class 3 was a top ranker and was regular to school. "However, during the Covid lockdowns, the boy could not attend online classes as he does not have a smartphone or access to any digital tools. He was compelled to assist his father in putting up manual swings at temples and residential complexes for the amusement of privileged children of his age," said Kumar.

Six-year-old Sonam was excited to hold a drawing copy and colour pencils as she loved drawing and colouring her imaginations. While the men work as daily wage labourers, their wives are employed as domestic help in residential apartments.

But the pandemic has hit them hard depriving them of their daily earnings.

NGOs and social workers like Tina and Vikram organise classes for children from poor families so that they are "not totally detached from classroom studies. Senior Rtn Rajeev Lotchan Bhardwaj, a former professor, also took free classes to children in their studies as and when required."

Club's IPP Dr Alok Mittal,
Manoj Kumar and Rtn Namrata
Panicker engaged the children with
fun activities and assured them of all
possible help towards education in
future. Club president Ashish Agarwal
expressed his interest in helping the
children in getting better education
for which he said that the "club will
support in all possible ways."
