These players will represent India in the world championship that is scheduled to be held in China.

Four nursing colleges have partnered with the club to execute the cancer-screening project in a phased manner across Chennai.

Rtn Dr Annie Grace, registrar of TN Nurses and Midwives Council is the project chair and is being supported by Rtns Praveen Mehra and Ram Kevalur. IPDG J Sridhar and DG Dr Nandakumar have appreciated the club for Project Mellinam.

A PHC gets a makeover

primary health centre (PHC) in Aundh, a Pune suburb, was transformed into a Covid treatment facility by RC Pune Sports City, RID 3131, through a global grant project in partnership with RCs Fort Collins Breakfast, RID 5440, US; Pune Camp; Pune Baner; and Aundh.

"The upgradation project at Aundh Kuti Rugnalaya was conceptualised in July 2020 at the peak of the pandemic, but it has to face several hurdles in the approval process and funding issues. Finally, we started the work in November 2021 and completed it in just four months," said Rtn Sandesh Savant, primary contact, RC Pune Sports City.

Also, due to the tough working conditions during the pandemic lockdown and labour and material issues related to running a PHC further compounded the problems. Catering mostly to the less privileged and backward people, the PHC, Aundh, offers free OPD services, immunisation for children, antenatal care for pregnant women,

safe deliveries, pharmacy, basic diagnostic testing, screening for TB and leprosy, and treatment for dog and snake bites.

Repair work

A range of renovation work including roof repair, waterproofing, false ceiling, partitions, revamping doctors' OPD, plastering and painting, electrical rewiring with new multiple points, installing fans, LED tube lights, and setting up hospital furniture has been done in a phased manner to convert the PHC into a Covid care facility. "We also installed equipment including baby warmer machines and Boyle's Apparatus; a TV for creating health awareness, intercom system and

watercooler as part of upgradation," said Savant.

However, in the course of the project, the executing team has to take up a lot of unplanned work such as putting new gates, building toilets etc. "We were able to provide new flooring to the new waiting room, cold chain carriers for vaccine doses, ice packs, and plumbing work with the balance amount we had," said the primary contact. After the repair work, a training programme was conducted for the paramedics and nurses to "ensure the sustainability of the project and improve the healthcare delivery for the patients."

Paschim Pune Bangiya Parishad and RC Newent, RID 1100, UK, also extended their funding support for the project. During the implementation, many inputs and suggestions given by the staff at the PHC, Aundh, were incorporated in the new Covid facility which is now providing "quality healthcare for thousands of poor families in and around the area. We are thankful to TRF and RID 3131 for providing funds to make this global grant project a reality," added Savant. ■
