'No tobacco' campaign launched in Agra

n awareness campaign against consumption of tobacco in any form was kicked off by RC Agra, RID 3110, on the occasion of World No Tobacco Day (May 31) with the support of Rotaractors and the district administration. "We organised an event for the public and morning walkers at the Paliwal Park and urged them to stop consuming tobacco. An appeal was made to the district authority to declare this park a tobacco-free zone as the first step," said Rtn Manoj R Kumar, club secretary and its primary contact.

Both Rotarians and Rotaractors took out a rally

around the Paliwal Park with banners and placards to sensitise the public on the health hazards of tobacco products which killed half its users before they reached adulthood. Addressing the gathering, Dr Surabhi Gupta, radiation oncologist, SN Medical College, Agra, highlighted the health issues one would face due to tobacco consumption, apart from cancer and urged the public to avoid such deleterious products for a healthy life.

Club president Ashish Agarwal (2021–22) urged the morning walkers at the park to make this green hub a tobacco-free space so that people could get fresh

air. A pledge was read out by Dr Alok Mittal, past president, for the club members, Rotaractors and the participants as part of the anti-tobacco campaign aimed at stopping people from consuming it. Senior members Shanti Swaroop Goyal and Umesh Gupta were also present, along with Anns and a large number of Rotaractors who made the arrangements for the event.

Flag exchange
