The Coast Guard officer assured him that he would be able to provide 50 artificial limbs through the Round

Table Organisation in Coimbatore. Vijayakumar is also an active member of All Kerala Wheelchair Rights Federation and wanted to provide artificial limbs to the disabled. Following the assurance from the Naval officer, "we started the work and within 20 days, we identified 40 amputees.

They were taken in two buses to the Coast Guard headquarters in Kochi, 70km from Alleppey, for taking

measurements to fit the artificial limbs," said Vijayakumar. But the club found only 30 amputees were eligible for the prosthetic limbs.

At a grand event inaugurated by former Kerala minister G Sudhakaran, Coast Guard commander Ravi distributed the arti-

ficial limbs to the beneficiaries. AG KG Gireesan, club's charter president Pradeep Koottala, secretary Suvi Vidyadharan and project coordinator Unnithan were also present. The limb distribution event was widely covered by news channels and in the local print media.

Diwali clothes for children in Bengaluru

As part of its silver jubilee project, the club is supporting 36 free surgeries this year with the support of its members, Siva Shakti Foundation, Bhagwan Mahaveer Jain Hospital, and making use of the government

support available for the BPL (below poverty line) card patients. Between July and October 2022, the club has successfully done 15 surgeries on BPL patients. The surgery cost of ₹1.4 lakh per patient is funded by the club (₹30,000), Siva Shakthi Foundation (₹10,000), BMJ Hospital giving a discount of ₹40,000, and BPL card subsidy of ₹60,000. ■

ver 1,500 schoolchildren from three schools in the town benefitted from a dental check-up camp organised by RC Nagapattinam, RID 2981. The club involved its Interactors at the Nagore Matric Higher Secondary School to give them a first-hand experience in project management. Around 500 children were treated for dental disorders at the Adarsh Matriculation Higher Secondary School, and all students in the three schools were given lessons in oral health and hygiene through a special session organised by the club.

Club president P Karthikeyan and project coordinator Dr V Govindarajulu played a significant part in organising the camps at the venues.

Environment projects

"The nets will also protect them from insect and snake bits. The idea of distributing mosquito nets was given by president-elect Pradeep Budbadkar after he read a news about the death of an Adivasi boy due to snake bite while sleeping in the night. The club will be distributing mosquito nets to other villages reaching out to more tribals in the coming months.

A two-day exhibition titled Samanvay was organised for Adivasis and rural artisans for selling their handicrafts to the city residents in Dombivli. "We provided forty free stalls to Adivasis and rural people

arriage counselling was given to 54 prospective brides and grooms suffering from vitiligo, a skin condition where it loses pigmentation leading to white patches, by RC Nagpur Metro, RID 3030, with the support of Shweta Marriage Bureau, Pune.

Shweta Association, the sister concern of the marriage bureau, has been working for boys and girls suffering from vitiligo, also known as leukoderma, over the last 22 years, besides creating awareness about this skin disorder in the society. Shweta Association founderpresident Dr Maya Tulpule, a general surgeon, informed the gathering that they have donated narrow band UVB phototherapy and Eximer Laser units to hospitals in Nagpur and other places for treatment of vitiligo. Dr Manjiri Oke, dermatologist, spoke on the scientific facts about the skin ailment and explained the benefits of the instruments donated by Shweta Association.

Rashmi Babhulkar, academician, presided over the marriage counselling session, while Dr Shyam Babhulkar, neurosurgeon, was the chief guest.
