Addressing healthcare and education needs in Pune

n a collaborative effort to enhance public health, RC Pune Sports City, RID 3131, with support from Emcure Pharmaceutical's CSR wing organised health screening camps for over 1,000 employees of Pune Mahanagar Parivahan Mahamandal Limited (PMPML). Conducted across six PMPML bus depots, the camps focused on raising awareness on breast and cervical cancer among women employees.

Despite awareness efforts, cultural hesitancy led to fewer women participating, with 117 undergoing mammography and 114 opting for Pap smear tests. Male employees were offered general health checkups, including blood tests, BP, sugar, cholesterol, dental and eye tests. The initiative was implemented with the help of Samarth Yuva Foundation and Dr Dada Gujar Hospital for Mother and Child Care. Screening results were confidentially shared with participants through PMPML depot managers.

The club in collaboration with Hodek Vibrations Technologies distributed 28 bicycles to underprivileged

girl students of Sharda Vidyalaya, Sahajpur, on Children's Day (Nov 14). The initiative, aimed at girls commuting over 2km to school, sought to reduce absenteeism and improve academic performance. The project was led by club members Ram Kulkarni and Prasann Chobe.■

Empowering students and promoting wellness

he Rotary Club of Agra, RID 3110, organised a postermaking and sloganwriting competition at the Sacred Mother Junior School in the city for students from Class 3 to 8. "A decline in vaccination rates in the past few years has raised concerns, leading to the possibility of resurgence of polio cases. Recognising the urgency, Rotary has stepped forward once again to reinvigorate its efforts toward boosting immunisation rates. We aim to organise similar competitions and workshops in more schools as they provide an effective channel to engage with parents and the broader community," said club president Namrata Panicker.

She added that 15 selected posters from the competition will be shared online to amplify polio awareness. The top three posters with the highest likes will receive awards.

The club conducted its 12th workshop on "Safe and Unsafe Touch" at the CF Andrew's School, Balkeshwar, Agra. The initiative, aimed at empowering children with knowledge about personal safety, was attended by over 600 students from Class 3 to 8.

Through an engaging storytelling session, Namrata Mishra, an expert on the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, introduced students to the concept of body boundaries and explained how to recognise and respond to unsafe touch. Her session

emphasised practical steps to empower children in protecting themselves.

Child sexual abuse expert and parenting coach Reema Ahmad further enriched the session with an interactive discussion. She reassured students that any form of abuse is never their fault and encouraged them to stay positive and confident, and explained the importance of listening to their inner instincts, or "navigation system," which can help them recognise when something is wrong and take appropriate action.

Club president Namrata urged the students to build a "safety circle" comprising five trusted individuals they can rely on during difficult times. The club also distributed informative posters on safe and unsafe touch, alongside emergency contact numbers, to be displayed prominently on the school premises.

As part of its literacy promotion efforts, the club gifted school bags, stationery items and dental kits to 140 students at a government primary school at Mehra Naharganj near Agra.

A medical check-up camp was organised earlier for the students.

Under its environment protection initiative, the club conducted a sapling plantation drive in two locations — Sector 9 Park, Awas Vikas Colony; and Rawat Farms, Sikandra — in the city. Club members Amit Sisodia and Ritunandan Singh took the lead by planting 60 saplings at the Sector 9 Park, and distributed 80 more saplings to the residents to plant them near their homes. Around 100 saplings were planted at the Rawat Farms with the participation of students from the Midas Academy. ■

Remembering road accident victims

he Rotary clubs of Visakhapatnam, RID 3020, came together to observe World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims on Nov 17. The event aimed to remember road traffic victims, acknowledge the work of emergency services, and advocate for better support and road safety measures.

Around 400 family members of road accident victims, 150 grievously injured individuals, Rotarians, students, NCC cadets and traffic wing police personnel participated in the memorial meet which provided a platform for road traffic victims and their families to share their experiences and memories. Around 650 people took the road safety pledge, and candles were lit in memory of the departed souls.

Dr Shankabrata Bagchi, police commissioner (Visakhapatnam), highlighted the city police's efforts to reduce road accidents and outlined measures such as controlling drunk driving, inspecting underage driving, and promoting awareness among school students and the general public. He commended Rotary's initiatives for road safety. Hearing the plight of victims' families, he announced that he will soon establish a 'Road Accident Victims Assistance Cell'

to ensure that the victims' families receive timely compensation.








RC Chidambaram Central – RID 2981







he Rotary Eye Donation Centre, established by RC Bombay West, RID 3141, in July 2019, has completed five years of collecting 704 corneas. Operating 24x7, the centre serves Mumbai's suburbs from Dahisar to Colaba in partnership with the Eye Bank Coordination and Research Centre (EBCRC), Parel.

Supported by the Inner Wheel Club and awareness campaigns, the initiative has significantly boosted public engagement, facilitating eight corneal transplants.

Rotary clubs across RID 3141, including RCs Mumbai Kandivli West,

Bombay Kandivli and Bombay North, are actively raising awareness about eye, skin and organ donation through school presentations at institutions like Lilavatibai Podar High School and MVM International School.

Efforts include WhatsApp banners consolidating donation contacts, donor recognition frames and PR campaigns. The Live Beyond Life Foundation, a Rotary initiative, is also holding organ donation seminars at NSS-affiliated colleges, with the first session addressing over 60 students at the Dr Ambedkar College, Mumbai.

Digital education for rural kids

Rural Development and Panchayat Raj (RDPR) department of Karnataka has launched a statewide Soft Skill and Literacy Enhancement programme as part of its Rural Digital Library Mission.

This ambitious initiative, aimed at uplifting rural communities across 31 districts in Karnataka, was formalised through a memorandum of understanding signed on Aug 12, in the presence of key dignitaries, including Karnataka CM Siddaramaiah and minister for rural development Priyank Kharge.

The programme, launched on World Librarian Day, is designed to enhance the quality of education and digital literacy in rural areas, focusing on underserved communities. In collaboration with Arivu Kendras (digital learning centers), the initiative will impart foundational literacy and numeracy skills to children aged 12–18 years.

The online sessions, available in Kannada, cover various topics, including communication skills, financial literacy, leadership, mental wellness and environmental awareness, delivered by experts from various fields.

Since its launch on Aug 31, the programme has already impacted over 700,000 children directly and is expanding through YouTube uploads for easy access to training material. Aiming for 52 sessions in its first year, the project is on track to reach one million rural children. The initiative underscores Rotary's commitment to empowering communities and fostering long-term sustainable change.

With Uma Mahadevan at the helm, known for her inclusive approach to rural development, the programme exemplifies how collaborative leadership can bring about meaningful, lasting transformation in rural Karnataka.

perspectives on peace-related issues.

In her video message, President Stephanie urged the

delegates to keep "advancing the magic of Rotary."

Sharing his experience in Rwanda where he saw the devastating impact of genocide and the power of reconciliation, PRIP Gordon McInally said the focus should be on peace, rather than conflict. "We have to work together to build a peaceful future as even in the darkest of times, hope and resilience can prevail," he said.

In his address, PRIP Shekhar Mehta turned the spotlight on service projects which will facilitate positive peace. "Fulfilling the basic needs like food, water and healthcare are essential for creating a peaceful environment," said Mehta.

Speaking on the joy of giving, DG Krishnendu Gupta called upon the Rotarians to give generously to TRF, a key player in promoting peace and global understanding. RC Battersea

Park past president Gill de Warren from London talked about the efforts of women in Afghanistan to overcome restrictions imposed on them since 2021 after the Taliban assumed power. Thousands of children are dying because of malnutrition, she said, calling for "urgent humanitarian assistance."

In their joint video presentation, John Hickey and Margi from RC Wilmington, US, detailed their five projects (\$288,000) with a number of Rotary clubs in warravaged Ukraine. "We provided thermal clothing,

clean water, food, medicines, shelter boxes, blankets, mats for underground schools etc. We stand with the people of Ukraine in this crisis," they said.

RC Calcutta president Subrata De said events like this

peace seminar remind them "about the true position of ourselves not only at the club level, but also in the world. The peace workshop on our Foundation Day is a landmark event not only in the City of Joy, but also for the country." Positive Peace workshop chair Saumen Ray said the Four-Way Test aligned with the assessment of community needs and service projects. "We need a holistic approach to peacebuilding that addresses both individual and societal needs," he said.

The participants were involved in group discussions that explored the challenges and opportunities for creating a harmonious world. There was a consensus among the delegates that such peace seminars and workshops are essential to foster collaboration, share knowledge and inspire action to address global challenges.■
